Theatre burns in Henry VIII cannon shocker



The Globe theatre burned down tragically yesterday during a production of William Shakespeare's Henry VIII. A cannon that was to be used as a special effect in the production was fired straight into the thatched roof which caused the blaze to start.

"This was a terrible loss" said Mister Shakespeare. The theatre, which could hold three thousand people, was the home of The Chamberlains' Men which is the best acting company in England. When the company was forced out of its home in Blackfriars the brothers Cuthbert and Richard Burbage took all the timber oaks from the Blackfriars site and rebuilt it in Bankside.

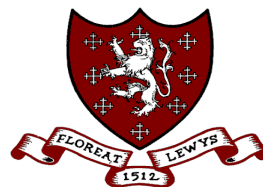
